COLLECTION OF EVIDENCE-BASED PRACTICES FOR CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS WITH MENTAL HEALTH TREATMENT NEEDS

STUDY PLAN

Study Mandate

The Virginia Commission on Youth is directed to:

- Revise the Collection of Evidence-based Practices for Children and Adolescents with Mental Health Treatment Needs (the "Collection"). The Collection is to be revised biennially pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 358 (2003).
- Seek the assistance of the *Collection* Update Advisory Group, Secretary of Health and Human Resources, Secretary of Public Safety, and Secretary of Education in posting, maintaining, and biennially updating the *Collection*.
- Make the *Collection* available through web technologies.
- Develop a cost-effective and efficient dissemination method to allow for easy access to the information.

Identified Issues

Background

- The *Collection* is a resource for providers, families, and other entities and individuals who work with children and adolescents who have mental health treatment needs. The *Collection* was originally published in 2002 and is updated biennially with the assistance of an advisory group of experts pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 358 (2003). Since its original publication, the *Collection* has been widely used and distributed.
- The intent of the *Collection* is to spread knowledge and awareness about evidence-based practices in the field of child and adolescent mental health. Identifying which treatment modalities are supported by scientific evidence helps families, clinicians, and other mental health decision-makers make informed choices.
- The 8th Edition update of the Collection was updated and published in 2021. The Collection was disseminated during 2022.

9th Edition Update

The 9th Edition update of the Collection is being updated in 2023. The section on Family First that was integrated into the 8th Edition of the Collection is being updated to include the most recent evidence based practices approved by the Federal Clearinghouse. Additionally, a new section on the Covid-19 pandemic and the impact on youth mental health is being added.

- "Family First." Staff will update a section that addresses and describes evidence-based treatments included in the Family First Evidence-based Treatment Clearinghouse.
- "Covid-19 Pandemic and Lockdown." Staff will add a section on the Covid-19 pandemic's impact on youth mental health. According to the C.S. Mott Children's Hospital National Poll on Children's Health in 2021, 46% of parents say they have noticed a new or worsening mental health condition for their teen since the start of the pandemic.

Study Activities

- Convene the *Collection* Advisory Group, made up of stakeholders and mental health experts, to assist with updating and disseminating the *Collection's 9th Edition*.
- Update current sections of the *Collection*:
 - Adjustment Disorder
 - o Antidepressants and Risk of Suicidal Behavior
 - o Anxiety Disorder
 - o Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder
 - o Autism Spectrum Disorder
 - o Bipolar and Related Disorders
 - o Depressive Disorders
 - o Disruptive, Impulse-Control and Conduct Disorders
 - Feeding and Eating Disorders
 - Intellectual Disabilities
 - o Juvenile Firesetting
 - o Juvenile Offending
 - Motor Disorders
 - o Nonsuicidal Self-Injury
 - Obsessive-Compulsive and Related Disorders
 - Schizophrenia
 - Sexual Offending
 - Substance Use Disorders
 - o Trauma- and Stressor-Related Disorders
 - Youth Suicide
 - o Family First
 - Complex Trauma
- Update or add new sections to the *Collection*:
 - Add "Covid-19 Pandemic and Lockdown." Describes the Covid-19's pandemic impact on youth mental health.
- Identify parameters and limits of 2023 biennial update (9th Edition):
 - o Evaluate disorders/illnesses and current mental health issues to be included.
 - o Identify and evaluate latest research in support of evidence-based treatments.
 - o Evaluate current rating scale for evidence-based treatments.
 - o Update links to external resources and identify new resources.
- Disseminate information about the *Collection's 9th Edition* online and in person at conferences and events.
- Continue to identify and implement cost-effective and efficient dissemination methods and partner with agencies/organizations.
- Prepare final report and submit to Governor and General Assembly.
